## Reception

**Background:** The Corporate Sustainability Due Diligence Directive (CSDDD) was adopted in June 2024 and represented a milestone in global efforts to ensure business respect for human rights and the environment. In February 2025, the European Commission presented an <u>omnibus proposal</u> to "simplify and streamline" EU directives on sustainability reporting and due diligence, including the CSDDD. There are ongoing <u>debates</u> about the extent to which these simplification efforts may weaken essential protections related to human rights and the environment.

The Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights has actively engaged with EU institutions regarding the CSDDD and omnibus proposal, issuing a <u>commentary</u> on the Commission draft in May 2025, complemented by a <u>press release</u> from the High Commissioner. The UN Working Group on Business and Human Rights has also issued statements in <u>February</u> and <u>March</u> 2025.
