Key messages to EU legislators

Simplification \neq deregulation. Sustainability and competitiveness go hand in hand. Competitiveness can be achieved alongside respect for human rights and the protection of the environment.

2

Maintain a risk-based approach, protect workers, and prevent them from being subjected to modern slavery.

3

Business resilience goes through all steps of the supply chain. Thinking long-term means maintaining a risk-based approach.

4

Simplification should not come at the expense of the CSDDD's objectives. Keep in mind who ultimately bears the costs of simplification.

5

Ensure open and inclusive stakeholder consultations in the due diligence process. Participation of those who are closest to victims and survivors is essential.

Listen to practitioners and experts to generate a law capable of achieving the objective of effectively addressing business impacts on people and the planet.
